Brief summary of day's ride:

What a great ride!! The drive to Avoca was interesting - very heavy frost and intermittent fog. I haven't seen frost hanging from the trees like that since I was a kid - and that wasn't yesterday!

As we weren't sure where the turn-off to Bonney Plains Road was, I was glad to see the Trail Ride sign sitting on the side of the road. I still managed to go past the yards where we leaving from, so had to back-up the float! We were surprised to see so many people there as we had arrived fairly early. The fog was still hanging and it was bloody cold.

We eventually got sorted, and the ride under-way, after some confusion over our pre-ride meeting. Some riders took off early and waited further down the road. This problem has now been addressed.

Four riders joined the ride shortly after we started - apparently these hearty souls (Steve, Wendy & Co.) had camped the night. (Overnight temperatures = minus 5 degrees!) Don't know how they managed to keep warm, but apparently their horses decided to go for an early morning run to warm up!
